Class Hours: This course will have 72 class hours, including 40 lecture hours, 10 lecturer office hours, 10-hour TA discussion sessions, 2-hour review sessions, 10-hour extra classes.

Course Description:

This course will introduce students to the fundamentals of philosophical discourse and reasoning. We will explore the nature of philosophical life and writing by exposing students to different thinkers in their intellectual context. In addition to learning how to think philosophically about moral, political, cultural, and religious issues, we will observe the discursive dimensions and changes in the history of philosophy.

Course Objectives:

The course is designed to teach careful reading, logical interpretation, and systematic reasoning. Students will also learn how to engage with philosophical arguments and debates. A series of writing exercises will improve students' abilities to express themselves academically.
