Class hours

This course will have 72 class hours, including 40 lecture hours, professor 10 office hours, 10-hour TA discussion sessions, 2-hour review sessions, 10-hour extra classes.

Course Description: This course focuses on the basic assumptions, research topics, theories and methodologies of sociology. Students will examine the ways in which social norms, values, roles and social structure impact the world around people and their positions in society. Topics include power, submission, conflict, social structure, socialization, social change, and social inequality.

Course Objectives: The purpose of this course is to introduce the student to the nature and characteristics of human societies and social life. We will examine basic sociological concepts, principles, research methods, and theory. Topics in this course include, but are not limited to, the following: origins of sociology, sociological theory and methods, social institutions,

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inequality, sexism, racism, family, stratification, and population studies. Given that this is an introductory course to the science of sociology, no previous knowledge of sociology on the part of the student is assumed. The material presented in this course is meant to provide an overview of the field of sociology, as well as an understanding of the sociological perspective of society.

A student who satisfactorily completes this course should:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of the major theoretical paradigms in sociology
- 2. Comprehend the basic concepts used by sociologists
- 3. Demonstrate the ability to interpret and critique empirical research
- 4. Understand basic social processes
- 5. Understand how social institutions function

Required Textbooks: Henslin, James M. 2019. Essentials of Sociology: A Down-to-Earth Approach (13th edition). Pearson Publishing: Boston, Massachusetts.

Course Requirements: Students are expected to:
