Course Description:

Globalization is profoundly reshaping social structure and transforming the lives of people in this world. Our personal lives are linked to increasingly dense networks of global interrelations, as the integration of societies, economies, and cultures fundamentally transforms human life. It is impossible to understand the world in the early 21st century without understanding globalization and its consequences. With this in mind, the objective of this course is to explore what has come to be known as globalization studies, and in particular, to survey the distinct sub-areas that make up the sociology of globalization.



Course Objectives:

- 1) Students are able to gain an understanding of globalization from a sociological perspective
- 2) Students are able to become familiar with various types of broad globalization forces
- 3) Students are able to critically examine the two sides of globalization, namely its positive and negative outcomes throughout the world
