This course is designed for students who have never taken a formal Japanese language class. This course is not for those who have studied basic Japanese including Hiragana, Katakana, past tense verb conjugation, adjective conjugation and Te-form. By the end of this summer session, students will be able to read and write the following sentences. If you can easily understand these sentences, this is not the right course for you.

きのう 私は としょかんに 行きました。としょかんで おもしろい本を かりました。としょかんの となりに こうえんが あります。 そして、ともだちに えきで 会って、いっしょに ボストンに 行きました。ボストンで ピザを 食べました。 ピザは やすくて とても おいしかったです。 ケーキも 食べました。 私は チョコレートケーキが 大すきです。

Textbooks:

Genki 1 (An integrated course in elementary Japanese). Banno, E. and et al. (Second Edition, 2011). Tokyo: The Japan Times. (Lesson 1 ~ Lesson 4 and some major materials in Lesson 5 & 6)

Course Descriptions:

The correct pronunciation, reading ability, system of writing, and fundamentals of grammar and syntax of the Japanese language are studied. Students are taught the four language skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Cultural topics are integrated with these skills. Japanese gradually becomes the working classroom language.

Course Goal:

The ultimate goal of this course is for students to develop a basic foundation of the Japanese language in order to acquire minimum communicative skills. Students will learn about 60 new words every chapter using Hiragana, Katakana and Kanji (traditional version). This course will cover first four chapters of the textbook and some important expressions from Chapter 5 & 6.
