Course Description:

This course focuses on the visual arts produced in the West from prehistory to the end of the Gothic era (c. 1400CE). The course examines the art and architecture of ancient Egypt, Greece, Rome, and Medieval Europe. Works are studied in their historical, social, and religious contexts, with particular focus on the role of art in society, the development of style, and the ways that visual culture communicates meaning. Students are introduced to basic principles of visual analysis, as well as the formal elements, significant design principles, and technical developments



in artistic production during this period.
