Course Overview:

This course is an introduction to literature in English that teaches students to read and write about literature. Reading involves the understanding and appreciation of poetry, prose and drama through the study of rhetoric, prosody, style, theme and genre. Writing includes attention to grammar and practice in clear and logical argumentation through the analysis of texts and sight assignments.



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Course Description:

This course is designed to provide a broad overview of English literature, through readings of classic texts from the canon of English literature.

By the completion of this course, students will have a strong understanding of the classics of English literature, in different genres.
